



Academic achievement in national and international qualifications is often championed by schools and eagerly reviewed by communities as a gauge of a school's performance and success; it also gives a school an opportunity to compare their results against other schools.

The so called "league tables" are sometimes fervently criticised by educators and teachers' unions. They argue that there are complicating factors with such a ranking system that can distort results and that they do not give a complete picture of student achievement or the success of the school. However, these results are quantifiable and accurate. I believe that parents want to know how well the school that is educating their children is performing. University Entrance is the premier qualification for New Zealand secondary school students. It provides the gateway to University and Tertiary study.

The main academic accountability for schools and parents is the percentage pass rate of students attaining their UE. Within schools there are a myriad of student academic abilities. Having a high level of diligence, perseverance and application to their studies does not come easy for many students. The processes, procedures, support and quality of teaching will significantly improve a student's success at school and will assist them to overcome individual challenges. Wentworth has the systems and school culture, as well as tone, to give every student the opportunity to achieve their best and, often, even surprise themselves by performing above expectation.

Wentworth College has one of the highest University Entrance pass rates in New Zealand. When the NZ Herald published the 2014 pass rate results, Wentworth was shown to have had 93% of its Year 13 students gain their University Entrance. In 2015 we saw these results climb to 95%. I believe this is an outstanding achievement, especially as 98% of our students study under the Cambridge International Examination (CIE) system with examinations being globally moderated.

An example of a student at Wentworth achieving outstanding results is Conrad Morley. In his Year 12 AS Art and Design examinations, Conrad won the prestigious "First in New Zealand" award in the 2015 Cambridge examinations.

Outstanding school achievement appears in many different forms; these are often based on a student's skills, interests and drive to follow a talent or their passion. These successes could be in the fields of sport, dance, music or community involvement.

The following are a number of examples of Wentworth students pursuing their passions:

Quinn Boyce-Bacon (Year 13) - Audio drama author. For Quinn's thriller short story "Virtue" he sought on-line actors to read the parts of his story.

Quinn co-ordinated the actors, and produced the music and sound. The excellent finished production can be listened to by scanning this QR code.



Ashley Horlock (Year 13) - St John's Paramedic. Ashley has worked and studied through the St John first aid programmes. He is currently a head trainer for the organisation, teaching basic first aid to groups of up to 20 students aged from 9 to 14 years. Ashley has achieved a "first responder" qualification and is also training to be an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT).

Nadija Rowley (Year 11) - Award winning dancer. Nadija won one of eight scholarships with the USA Phoenix International Dance Company, against 230 dancers. This is an excellent addition to her already impressive dance CV. Nadija was selected for the NZ School of Dance Associates programme that has seen her attend two week long workshops in Wellington over the last two years.

Conrad Morley (Year 13) - award winning short film maker. Conrad's media/film making talents are evidenced in the numerous short films he has produced for Wentworth of our school sporting and cultural events. Primary School Highlights

The Years 5 and 6 students attended a bike safety programme held at the school. They learnt the Bike Road Code and how to be safe on the road, as well as basic bike and helmet maintenance.

The whole school also participated in the ASB Get Wise Financial programme. This programme helps young people to understand the difference between 'wants' and 'needs', what banks do and what a credit card is and how it operates. These are concepts that every child should know.

One of the highlights in Term 1 was Grandparents Day, which saw 40 to 50 grandparents attend school for a half day. They were invited to come to class and do some learning. The grandparents also told us stories about their schooling days and how things are very different nowadays. Discussions about discipline and receiving the cane or the strap were very topical. Grandparents then stayed for morning tea and some playground fun.

We had a visit from the students of Buntoku High School from Kumamoto, Japan. Our Japanese visitors taught the Wentworth Primary students the art of paper folding (or origami). We made cranes, swans, flowers and darts.

Life Education came to the school and students were able to meet Harold the Giraffe whilst learning about relationships and friendships. Harold was everyone's favourite!

The second major highlight of the Term was the Teddy Bears'

Competition sailing is the name of the game for these experienced sailors and a successful series of regattas over summer saw them qualify for the 'Gold Fleet' in the National Secondary Schools' Team Sailing Regatta held at Algies Bay at the end of April. After a dazzling start in the first round-robin event, Wentworth went on to claim the Bronze medal, which qualifies them to compete in the Inter-Dominion regatta against Pacific teams later in the year.

Congratulations to Conrad Morley (Year 13) who was awarded **1st place in New Zealand** for the 2015 Cambridge International AS Level Art & Design: Graphic Design. This means that Conrad achieved the highest standard mark in New Zealand for this subject. This is an impressive achievement with more than 1 million students worldwide sitting the Cambridge examinations in more than 10,000 schools last year

During the Term Years 12 & 13 students studying AS & A2 Biology, and those taking the new 'Marine Studies' course, spent the day on Rotoroa Island. Upon arrival on the island, students were first given an introduction to the geological history of New Zealand and an explanation of the isolation of a range of environments leading to unique ecosystems. They were also given information on the influence of the introduction of non-endemic species to New Zealand. Students took part in an Open Country Bird Count as they sat on the top of the island surrounded by the blue skies and emerald waters of the Hauraki Gulf. During their lunch break the group were fortunate to witness members of Auckland Zoo releasing a juvenile Kiwi. After lunch, more sampling techniques were carried out around the island and on the beach with students being taught how to use GPS as a tool for field-work.



Pacific Picnic

On the last day of the Term, Year 8 students hosted a Pacific picnic. Students have been learning about the Pacific during Social Studies. They had the chance to embrace traditional island culture and food and drink whilst raising money for cyclone affected Ellington School in Fiji. It was an opportunity not to be missed with food stalls revealing a wonderful mix of coconut drinks and island cakes, as well as providing entertainment in the form of a hoola-hoop competition and limbo dancing. A total of \$710.50 was raised which was presented to Ellington School when Miss Fisher visited during the holidays. Well done Year 8!

After graduating from Wentworth Gideon enlisted with the New Zealand Navy where he is currently employed as a Warfare Officer. Gideon has a passion for flying and has been able to pursue this passion through the Navy. After completing 25 weeks of Basic Flying Training in Tamworth, Gideon has now moved on to Perth where he is undergoing Advanced Flying Training using the Pilatus PC-9 aircraft. This is a more powerful aircraft to teach 'military flying' and they have to wear G-suits, helmets, etc.

Following graduation from the advanced training course (known as the "wings" ceremony), Gideon returns to New Zealand where he will be based initially at Ohakea for helicopter conversion on the Air Force helicopters and then back to Whenuapai for his ultimate role as pilot on the Navy's Seasprite helicopters which are deployed on board ships at sea.
